

Who is the Donor State?

Our HOPE is Kentucky
No formal agreement yet, but we have met
Current elk herd of 10,000+
Never a case of CWD in their wild elk or deer
Our request is for 150 elk over 3 years
As early as 2015, if approved













Reintroduction Concerns

Common Concerns: - Impacts of Predators - Cost of Importing - Long-term Management Cost - Potential for vehicle accidents - Threat of Disease - Reduced Access - Crop Damage

Import Costs of Additional Wild Elk

~\$500,000 total

Funding Sources:

- RMEF \$300,000+
- Ho-Chunk Nation \$150,000
- Jackson County Wildlife Fund \$50,000
- Chippewa Tribes
- Jackson County Forest and Parks
- Other partner support



Long Term Management Costs

Current Annual Budget: ~\$200,000

Fish and Wildlife Segregated Funds and General
 Program Revenue

Future Budget

- Cautiously optimistic for 2015 public hunt
- Elk hunt application fees and license sales: ~\$400,000/year
- Continued partner contributions

Threat for Disease

- Legislation required to allow for import (passed)
- All currently available tests will be conducted
- TB, Brucellosis, CWD
 Seek disease-free donor (best option is Kentucky)
- Sample deer within CL and BR elk range prior to importation of new elk
